#### **Jobs and careers**

It's a broad sector with roles relating to different types of animal care for animals in catteries, fisheries, kennels, stables, veterinary practices, wildlife parks and zoos.

#### **Qualifications & Skills**

Most entry level jobs require a GCSEs in English and Maths as a minimum. For these type of roles, training on the job will be provided by the employer.

Apprenticeships are available at Intermediate, Advanced and Higher levels including: Animal care and Welfare, Animal Trainer, Dog Grooming Stylist, Equine Groomer, Veterinary Nurse

For example, the RSPCA offers apprenticeships in its animal centres and the retailer, Pets At Home, offers Dog Grooming and others. There is more information here:

Some Further Education Colleges offer vocational qualifications at levels 1 to 3 in subjects including Animal Care, Dog Grooming and Horse Care.
